August's History Walk: Oberlin Women's History

August 6, 13, 20, & 27 at 11:00 am



This July, OHC is offering our ***One Step More: Oberlin Women's History walking tour*** on Saturdays at 11:00 a. m. This tour highlights struggles for women's rights in Oberlin's past as well as the important local figures who led the fight.

In 1834, John J. Shipherd pledged Oberlin's commitment to "the elevation of female character" through education. Little did he know, there was dynamite in that promise, and women carried the matches. Hear stories of powerful Oberlin women including Lucy Stone, Marianne Parker Dascomb, Adelia Field Johnston, Mary Church Terrell, and Lucy Stanton Day, and learn how they used Shipherd's promise to shape what it meant

to be a woman in Oberlin and in the United States. Note: this tour begins at the Flagpole on Tappan Square at the corner of College and Main Streets.

Stan Miller Memorial

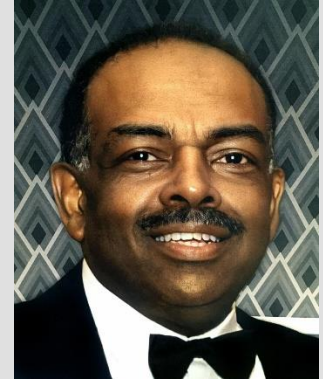
Saturday, August 20, 3:00 pm

In the event of rain, the event will be held at The First Church in Oberlin, U.C.C. and the location change will be confirmed on their website (firstchurchoberlin.org).

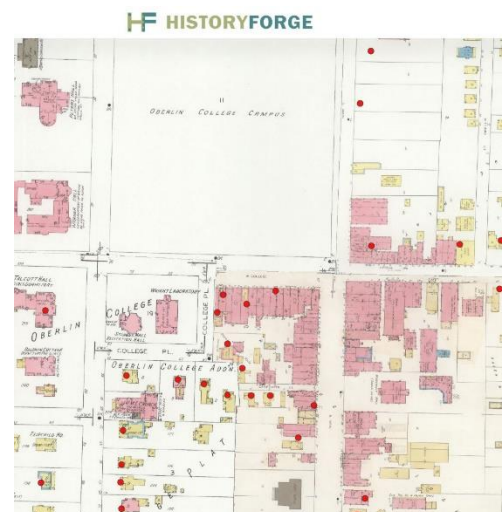


Comparing & Contextualizing Oberlin's 1940 Census in HistoryForge

Zoom Presentation - August 23 at 7:00 p.m.

Join Ohio History Service Corps member Erin Robichaud as she shares OHC's exciting progress on HistoryForge, a database that plots census information onto interactive map layers. Come ready to compare employment, divorce, and home ownership statistics from the 1910 & 1940 censuses. Erin will also discuss the cultural context and controversies surrounding the 1940 census – such as how the Great Depression influenced census questions and impacted Oberlin residents – and depict the enumerators who originally collected census data by hand.

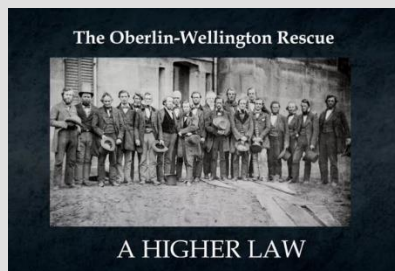

Oberlin-Wellington Rescue Documentary

Two Ohio filmmakers are producing a new documentary about the dramatic Oberlin-Wellington Rescue that will focus on a retelling of the rescue of John Price from slave catchers who abducted him in 1858. He was freed by a rescue party of white and black Oberlin and Wellington residents who helped him escape to Canada, an act which violated the Fugitive Slave Law. These rescuers were then arrested and tried by the federal government while being held at the Cuyahoga County Jail.

Also of Interest:

Cassie Chadwick: The Female Wizard of Finance

Ohio History Connection recently published an [article](#) about the life and crimes of Cassie Chadwick, one of the most notorious con artists in American history.

She is best known for a string of largely successful frauds in which she posed as the illegitimate daughter of Andrew Carnegie using forged promissory notes to secure large loans from banks throughout the Cleveland area. It is estimated that she stole \$633,000 (the equivalent of \$20 million today) throughout her many scams.

Chadwick is particularly connected to Oberlin history because the Citizen's National Bank of Oberlin loaned her a large sum near the end of her grift and the bank was forced to close after the fraud was revealed. In a twist of fortune, this fraud led to Andrew Carnegie deciding to build the Carnegie Library that is now part of the Oberlin College campus.
